


Our 3rd grade celebrated "March is Reading Month" with a traditional Lumberjack breakfast!

Mr Jarvis's AP Environmental Science students had the awesome opportunity to meet virtually with Flint pediatrician and author of What the Eyes Don't See, Dr. Mona Hanna-Attisha. Mrs. Brett Howard communicated with the Great Michigan Reading Program and other districts to organize this talk. Dr. Mona was scheduled to come talk with North Muskegon and other area schools as a part of the Michigan Humanities Great Michigan Read Program last year, but that was cancelled due to COVID-19. So after a year of waiting, we were excited to ask questions and listen to Dr. Mona. She is credited with helping to reveal the seriousness of the Flint Water Crisis, and inspiring countless communities toward making policy choices for the greater good for all. Through careful examination of high levels of lead in children's blood, she was able to shine a light on "What the Eves Don't See" and what became a public health crisis. Dr. Mona is a hero! She is an inspiration to us all, reminding us of our true potential to leave a positive impact. The work has just begun!



Future Proud Michigan Educator Grant Awarded to NM!

Our School Improvement Specialist, Jonathan Allen, applied for and received a \$10,000 Grant this spring to help plan and prepare to run a Proud Future Michigan Educators program. This program will help recruit, train, and support North Muskegon students interested in becoming teachers and other educators over the next several years.

This grant, awarded by the Michigan Department of Education, is intended to help meet the huge need for quality educators now and in the years to come. Students will be specifically recruited from underrepresented demographic groups and those interested in high-demand positions such as special education and mathematics. Of course, any and all students thinking about entering the teaching profession are encouraged to join!

The money from the grant will specifically support our customized, local curriculum for training our own future teachers and giving them an abundance of real-life practice within our entire district. High School students thinking about becoming teachers will have an elective class available to them starting this fall! After mastering the skills in that class they may opt to enroll in a course similar to "student teaching" to collaborate with one of our own teachers to lead student learning! We plan to also help provide additional support for these students as they navigate college applications and the teacher certification process in the years following graduation.

Ultimately, we hope to have a number of our own Norse graduates return to us in the following years to serve a new generation of our students!

North Muskegon Library Endowment Fund Donation Enables Diverse Book Purchases District-wide

Over the summer of 2020, North Muskegon residents Dorsey Sherman, Jessica Cook, and Mike Schanhals wanted to do something to positively impact the North Muskegon Community. They worked with the Muskegon Community Foundation to create an endowment for North Muskegon Public Schools' libraries to purchase books that promote diversity and equity. The endowment's mission to provide funding for the purchase of books that promote diversity





is in keeping with the North Muskegon School Library Media Centers' Mission Statement and Philosophy which says: "The North Muskegon School Library Media Centers exist to serve the entire school community. We support and encourage the curiosity and skills that lead to lifelong learning and responsible citizenship. We promote a love of reading through a diverse collection that allows students to see themselves and understand and respect other people, cultures, and ways of life."

Thanks to generous donations from community members, the Library Endowment Fund met (and surpassed) its initial fundraising goal of \$10,000, which enabled an inaugural gift to the school libraries of \$2000 to purchase



diverse books for March is Reading Month. The Library Endowment Fund hopes that with continued community support, it will be able to provide annual donations to the school libraries for many years to come.

On a side note, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Library Endowment Fund founders, and the amazing community members who provided the donations that made this fund possible; your generosity is so appreciated! It will help us to provide "mirrors and windows"

experiences for our students. These allow students to see themselves reflected in the pages of a book, as well as glimpse the lives and experiences of others, helping to build empathy and understanding. 
Norse Education Foundation Update

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

Unity Day 2021

Wednesday, May 5 • 1:45 p.m. to 2:45

Conversation focused on the impact of Race and Racism in our Communities. We heard from a panel of local community members who shared their personal stories and experiences with a student interviewer. The interviewer asked questions submitted by NM students prior to the event.

The goal of Unity Day is to promote unity within and across our communities through the healing power of storytelling. Our motto for our annual Unity Day event is "Let Love Lead." We are working with the Kingian principles of nonviolence:

PRINCIPLE THREE: Nonviolence seeks to defeat injustice, not people. Nonviolence recognizes that evildoers are also victims and are not evil people.

The nonviolent resister seeks to defeat evil, not people.

PRINCIPLE FOUR: Nonviolence holds that suffering can educate and transform. Nonviolence accepts suffering without retaliation. Unearned suffering is redemptive and has tremendous educational and transforming possibilities.

Our NM clinicians and counselors provided mental health support and mindfulness exercises for our staff and students before and after our Unity Day event.

Unity Day has been funded by a grant from the Stephen H. Clink Philanthropic Fund of the Community Foundation for Muskegon County

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


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DAR Awards Mr. DeLong!
