Stewardship at Central

Some of the best learning this past school year took place outdoors, as students grades K – 4th took part in a host of stewardship activities to transform our campus and community.

After learning about native plants and how various needs are met within a given ecosystem, fourth grade students decided to remove the rock landscaping at the south side of the building and create a Native Plant Garden instead. Students researched plants, types of soil, sunlight amounts, and other survival needs to determine the most sustainable options. In addition, the garden will attract pollinators to the area.

Kindergarten students completely transformed the east end of the

building by adding a Sensory Garden to their playground. The Kinder-Garden includes two "taste" garden beds with tomatoes, beans. and peppers, a "smell" garden with lavender, mint, basil, and thyme, a "touch" garden with plants of cool texture, and a "see" garden with beautiful flowers that attract butterflies. See the sunflowers bloom later this summer!

Our courtyard has been another area of focus. Second grade students used their EL modules

to enhance their learning around pollinators. Students researched various native plants that attract pollinators and voted on four different plants to include in the Pollinator Garden. In partnership with the Muskegon Lake Nature Preserve, our first grade enhanced the EL Bird modules by supplying both the courtyard and local nature preserve with bird houses and bird baths to better care for our local wild bird population. First grade students also planted trees at Snug Harbor and the Winter Sports Complex.

Giant thanks to our PBL consultants, community partners, and parent volunteers. We look forward to the difference our students will continue to make as problem-solvers of realworld problems in the years to come!



1st Graders **Love Birds**

First graders have been learning about the physical characteristics of birds and researching to learn about how different body parts of birds help them to survive. Students began by bringing in nests and feathers for observations.

Then each student made bird feeders and then used their own toy binoculars to observe birds in our nature garden. They discovered that camouflaging themselves and staying very still and quiet were important for bird watching!

Students also enjoy listening to read alouds, researching specific birds in groups, writing down facts they discover to make bird riddles, singing songs about birds, and making scientific drawings from bird observations. We even hatched our own chicks from eggs!














It's Pollination Time!

Water Walk

Did you know some children around the world have to walk more than 15 minutes to get water? They collect water for the day for drinking, cleaning, and cooking, and return again the next day.

The 3rd graders at Twin Lake Elementary have been learning about water resources around the world in reading. To help us gain a better understanding of how water is collected around the world, we went on a Water Walk to Twin Lake Park. The 3rd graders walked with empty milk/water jugs. At the park we filled up our jugs and returned with our collected water to school. The water was used to water plants in our garden. We sketched a sequence brainframe of our experience and also wrote a reflection.

3rd grader Alex, challenged himself to carry two jugs of water. He said, "His back was very sore!" Skylar said, "It was hard to carry the water, I had to take lots of breaks, but I did it!" Calvin and Landon worked together to carry a 5-gallon bucket of water back to school.

After our Water Walk experience the kids now have a better understanding of what it might feel like to walk to get water for our daily needs. They also have a better appreciation for the water they have every day.





Project Based Learning Continues To Thrive at RPI!











Carter's classes created a Living Museum of American History.





The students researched a historical figure that was connected to their social studies learning this year. They wrote an essay and then created a background poster describing their figure. In costume, the students acted as wax statues. When the museum visitor pressed the play button, the students came alive and gave a short speech about themselves as the historical figure.

Students in Mrs. Kingma's class made water filters today with slide shows in Spanish to send to students in Costa Rica and Cuba where Mrs. Kingma has taught in the summertime. The filters worked and this service project taught students how to share knowledge about clean water and its importance about children having rights to clean water. We are fortunate to live by Lake Michigan and have clean filtered water here.

Mrs. Moore and Mrs. Meekhof's 6th grade class invited Dr. Michael Smith to their classroom to expand on their learning surrounding transmission of infectious diseases. A great way to apply science to all the information we are all learning while living through a pandemic.











A Long Walk To Water Strength Auction

Our fifth-grade students, once again, studied the book A Long Walk To Water by Linda Sue Park. In the book, students followed a "lost boy" from Sudan fleeing from a war near his village and also a 10-year-old girl who walks for water twice a day for her family. Working through this project allowed kids to get a glimpse of the struggle that many face by having to walk for water. As a group we loaded up our own gallon jugs and jerry cans (5.3-gallon jug) to walk to the Muskegon River (3 miles there and back). We filled up and carried them back for 3 consecutive days. This was so eye opening for many kids. It was hard work. They began to find more gratitude for the things they had easy access to. We used this experience to drive many conversations about what strength looks like and the many ways people can demonstrate their strength.

As a public product and the piece of this project that allowed our own students to have a great deal of human impact, they each created a piece of art that represents STRENGTH. Each piece of art was unique to the talents and interests of the student artist and the money raised by the sale of each piece would go to the water charity the artist chose.

At the conclusion of the project a check for \$1,873 was sent to Waves for Water; a global charity that focuses its efforts on getting clean water to everyone who needs it. A check for \$1,277 was sent to Water for South Sudan; a charity that provides access to clean and safe water in South Sudan. And 135 weeks of clean water were purchased through Mudlove, a company that partners with Water for Good providing clean water to people in the Central African Republic









Camp Invention



Registration and Student Schedule Pickup



Rocket Club

Did you go to Laketon Junior High? How about Reeths-Puffer Junior High or Reeths-Puffer Middle School? If you answered "Yes" to any of these questions, more than likely you had an opportunity to

build and launch rockets at the end of your 8th grade year. The Reeths-Puffer Rocket Club was started in the early 1970's by former 8th grade teacher Ms. Toy. Hello Rocket Families and Friends

I am very excited to welcome everyone to the 2021/22 school year, the year we are calling..." Back to Better".

As our new school year approaches, much of the focus is on schedules, busses, teacher names and getting back into the routines of school life. I wanted to give everyone a "cheat

sheet" of curriculum jargon that you might hear your kids or school staff say to you in the upcoming weeks.

As a parent, I know LOL, BTW, BFF and BRB are codes used when texting or in chat rooms. R-P classrooms have some codes as well and if you are like me, knowing some jargon gives me the opportunity to prompt conversations with my kids about their day at school.

- 1. IM = Illustrative Math: This is our core math program Kindergarten through Algebra 2. We started using this program at the Middle School 6 years ago and have now expanded this to be our program district wide. Your child might say, "I have work in my IM workbook tonight."
- 2. EL = Expeditionary Learning: This is our district's Language Arts curriculum K-5. The program emphasizes learning to read, in early elementary, within engaging modules and then continues to take students through themed based modules that incorporate authentic writing, project design and aligned assessments. Your child might say, "I have to find a picture of a frog for my EL project." This is common as the books, learning goals and projects all connect back to a common engagement theme in science or social issues.
- 3. 180 Days = This is our core Language Arts curriculum in grades 6-12. It

is composed of EL modules, MAISA units (Michigan based Language Arts Curriculum) and self-created units. 180 Days are the principles that guide our instruction to develop literacy skills in writing and ready at the secondary level. We have 24 staff members that have trained with the authors of 180 Days over the last 3 years and are implementing the principles in their classrooms. The principles of high-quality literacy instruction are: Purposeful reading and writing every day, students collaborate and talk in groups about what they read and write, students will read required text and interest-based text daily, teachers' passion for reading and student interest are part of the instructional practices. Your child might say, "I am in a literacy circle and committed to read 30 pages tonight for our meeting tomorrow."

- 4. FB = Fastbridge = This is the national assessment used to assess how students are progressing year to year in their math, literacy and social skills. The information is not used for grading purposes but allows for the district to respond with some classroom instruction changes to better meet their needs. This assessment is given district wide 3 times a year. Your child might say, "I have to Fastbridge today in my English class."
- 5. PBL = Project Based Learning: We have many classrooms engaging in project-based learning, connecting the content in their classrooms to people and projects around Muskegon, Michigan and the world. This allows our students and teachers to demonstrate learning by collaborating together and creating projects as a classroom, grade level or content area. Your child might say, "Can I get pipe cleaners or some sticks, I need to build a protocol for my PBL project?"
- 6. Mi-STAR = Michigan Science Teaching and Assessment Reform: Over the last 6 years we have been leaders in our state utilizing the Mi-STAR curriculum through training and question-based instruction in grades 6-8 but many of the practices are utilized in classrooms 5-12. The principles of this curriculum are curiosity, increased exploration, problem solving and student lead collaboration. Your child might say, "My teacher doesn't answer my questions, they just ask me another one." THIS is on purpose so that the student continues to seek answers and solutions instead of seeking a teacher to tell them.
- 7. SEL = Social Emotional Learning K-12: This is part of our PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) system and the "Rocket Way". Our district continues to move forward emphasizing a positive learning environment, valuing relationships and teaching social skills to

give our students an edge in the world to contribute. Your child might say, "In a circle this morning we shared a time we were frustrated and how we overcame the frustration."

8. CKH = Capturing Kids Hearts: We are in our 3rd year as a district utilizing CKH strategies. These strategies enhance student connectedness to others by promoting healthy bonds with teachers, coaches, and school staff. Your child might say, "We shared good news in 3 of my classes today, it sure is different starting my science class like that."

I hope that this list is a good starting point to continue our support of each other and our kids with the R-P learning jargon!

R-P Summer Acceleration

Rocket City was a busy place this summer! Our community extended the school year for 8 weeks with programs for all grades, K-12. The Programs ranged from Camp Invention with our US patent office to Projects with our community partners to help students identify their internal strength and how their strength can be used to contribute to the world around them. This was a way to help support our students for the 20-21 school year and part of our mission for the year of "Return to Better". As we continue to learn the pandemic's impact on our kids we are confident that through creative programming, human relationships, community support and our teachers that we will have stronger learners and be a stronger

community in the upcoming school year.

During our summer program students participated in project-based learning (PBL) with visits to various locations in our community to add authentic learning experiences to their day.

Keeping our Focus on our Long-Term Learning Goals

When I was young, I asked my grandma "Why don't we have eyes like fish?" "What do you mean?" she asked. "On the sides of our heads looking in different directions," I answered. My grandma laughed and then told me... "Look out that window and enjoy the view." I feel like that small moment, sitting on my grandmother's couch on Stony Lake, held a question and a response that has somehow led me to where we will continue to set goals for learning at R-P.

I will never forget her simple guidance and now I realize that my eyes are "on the front of my head" to look forward, move forward and enjoy the view.

Over the last 18 months we have learned a lot about each other and the ways that our community responds to challenges. We have probably adapted more in the last 18 months than in the last 35 years. The list of school related changes would take up the entire page for this school year alone, but one thing I can confidently say is that we keep showing up and adapting to make sure that our kids are learning and ready to contribute.

Looking ahead, as a community, we must use what we have learned from the last 18 months to rethink, retool and maximize our time. Heading into the new chapter at R-P we have discovered a few things that will shape us moving forward.

- 1. The voices of our students and families can help guide what we do to maximize our kids' learning experience. I had a mom say to me while on the phone, "I know you are busy but..." I stopped her and said, "You and your child are my business, I'm not too busy at all." She spoke about an improvement idea for her child, who was a Rocket Virtual Edmentum student. She wondered about the possibility of her child participating in school-wide activities, joining through Google Meet, to help her feel connected to R-P. This comment prompted multiple events, within the district, in which our Rocket Virtual Edmentum students became a priority for inclusion to increase their R-P community connection.
- 2. The feedback from our community matters to support our kids. Throughout the year several surveys have been sent out. Many times, they are passive surveys asking for impressions or thoughts on choices the district has made. Some of the surveys were active surveys meaning, due to legislation timelines and changes in the state's covid response, action had to be taken. This feedback was purposeful in helping to support students and families in structural, instructional and cultural decisions and has proven to be priceless as we continue to navigate improvements at R-P.
- 3 Flexibility matters and can improve learning experiences. We have implemented 7 different instructional models and each building has variations of these based on our community needs. WOW! As a community we are adaptable and can handle change respectfully while our kids have, and will continue, to watch us navigate their future.
- 4. Change is OK when we are in it together. Often, I am asked if I like leading change, I laugh because I really believe that I get to walk with people through change.
- 5. We have launched a R-P Summer Acceleration Program that was based on student feedback and questions our families have asked about over the last 18 months.

As we start the next chapter for learning at R-P we must take with us the learning and improvements from the last chapter that allowed the processes we are growing from. Remember "Our eyes are in the front of our head for a reason." especially as we move forward, together, as a community.
