The original incident is appalling, without a doubt, but watching and hearing our student leaders find a way to educate while blazing a path towards healing the hurt was truly incredible. When our students lead the way, it is amazing what can happen.

We get to see Kindergarten students welcoming a new classmate, we get to see middle school students rallying around the success of a friend, we get to see our high school students thriving in the academic, arts, and athletics worlds. Our kids have found a way to help all of us be a little bit better by being who they are. The future is very bright thanks to the student leaders abundant at Mona Shores!

As a community, let's make 2022 the year to focus on the good, celebrate the positive, and enjoy all of the great things we get to be a part of in Mona Shores!

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Bonded Construction Update

Lincoln Park Elementary is finished!







All classrooms are complete and the students and staff have settled into their new spaces. Due to the pandemic and shut down in May 2020, the entire construction schedule had to be re-phased delaying completion to Thanksgiving rather than the start of school. Original construction cost was \$11,009,500. We had budgeted an additional \$942,101 in construction contingencies of which we have \$98,268 remaining to date, for a total build cost of \$11,853,333. We fully expect to have some minor items pop up and need correcting throughout the winter, which could reduce that contingency amount should that occur.

Construction is continuing to go well. Churchill Elementary is on track for completion by spring break of 2022. Ross Park Elementary and Campbell Elementary are on schedule and the Middle School went out for bid on November 24th with bids due on December 15th. Once again, I would like to thank our community and staff for their support and patience throughout this project.

a message from Andy Hogston, Director of Curriculum, Instruction & Assessment

2021 Highlights and Preparation for 2022

Despite the fact that 2020 and 2021 have been extremely challenging and complicated times for all of us, we have managed to resume some curriculum projects. We are always looking forward and preparing to continually improve resources, curriculum, and strategies for "Teaching & Learning".

Several Highlights for 2021:

- The approval, adoption, and purchase of the 2018 version of Math Expressions. This work was nearly complete and a recommendation ready to be made when the COVID-19 virus hit. However, we were able to have this in place for the 2021-22 school year. This replaces the 2013 version of Math Expressions. We are in the process of establishing a multi-year plan for ongoing professional learning related to Math Expressions and instructional practices.
- The addition of a full-time K-3 Literacy Coach.
 Mrs. Michelle Wahlberg is working with our four elementary buildings. This is made possible through a grant initiative and funding in partnership with the MAISD. This work connects perfectly with our district learning focused on the instructional practices of the 10 Essentials of Literacy.
- K-8 Benchmark Assessments

We are once again administering a common benchmark assessment three times per year (Fall, Winter, Spring) for both Math and Reading. It provides another measure of student performance individually and overall.

- New Elementary Health Special
 - This school year began with a new addition to the elementary specials rotation. Health has been added to the schedule and is taught by our Physical Education teachers. We are utilizing the MI Model of Health as our primary resource for this class.
- The Middle School launches its first Robotics Team.
 - This new opportunity for students links our programs from the elementary to high school.
- The Middle School purchases FOSS Science as the new Science resource 6th-8th.

 This process began a number of years ago, but the middle school science team has officially started the process of transitioning to utilizing FOSS this school year.
- Updating and Re-tooling our District Strategic Plan (DSP)
 The DSP prioritizes district focus. This work will take place this school year.
- The High School & Middle School resume student performances and activities.
 - This school year most of the traditional and much anticipated activities from the Academics, Arts, and Athletics have resumed (with few restrictions). This has been a welcomed return. The opportunity for students to once again participate and thrive in a multitude of activities has been refreshing and wonderful for our Sailor Family!

The last year has reminded me that it is more important than ever to show our gratitude to others. To give others the benefit of the

doubt. To look for the good. To appreciate and acknowledge the "big" & "little" things. To recognize the humanity that connects us all. Thank you parents, grandparents, educators, and students for all your contributions to Sailor Nation. Hoping that 2022 will be your best and most productive year yet!


Spring Assessment Schedule

on Gale was appointed as Chief of the Norton Shores Police Department on December 1, 2014. Prior to that appointment, he served the NSPD for twenty years as a patrol officer, narcotics investigator, traffic investigator, administrative sergeant, patrol sergeant, and patrol lieutenant.

School safety has always been a passion of Chief Gale as he strives

for better security measures in Muskegon County schools. He served on a team which implemented a countywide school lock down policy, and led a team of police, fire and school experts to create a countywide school emergency management plan. He founded the award-winning FACE THE BOOK and RIDE with PRIDE programs, which actively seek new ways for youth to make positive choices. Each of these programs began in the Mona Shores School District, and have now expanded into nine other school districts in Muskegon and Oceana counties.

Chief Gale and the Norton Shores Police Department is proud to provide an accredited police department to our community that continues to strive to be better. The police department employs two full-time school resource officers who assist at the Mona Shores High and Middle schools. These officers are assigned to a variety of tasks, but focus on a mentorship mentality. School resource officers also work with school administration to find creative solutions and promote positive behavior. Also, two new traffic specialist positions were created this year to provide targeted traffic enforcement in and around the schools to make the commute safer for our children.

New specialty positions were also implemented in 2021 with the support of Mayor Nelund and the City Council. Federal and State grants were secured to fund these new positions, which included two full-time detectives that were hired and compensated through the Federal Stop Violence against Women fund. This grant funding allows the police department to dedicate these detectives to investigate crimes that include; criminal sexual conduct, domestic abuse, stalking, and other serious crimes committed against women.

The police department also joined forces with AgeWell Services, and the Muskegon County Prosecutor's office to receive a grant through the Muskegon County Senior Millage. This grant provides dedicated detectives to investigate crimes against our senior population. This successful team has investigated over forty cases this year of abuse and fraud, and has recovered hundreds of thousands of dollars in restitution for victims in Muskegon County.

Effective mental health response is another major focus of the NSPD. The police department has teamed up with Health West to provide a co-response model to mental health calls. Police officers, medical personnel, and mental health professionals collaborate together to get people in crisis the help they need. Chief Gale is continuing to work at both the state and local levels to provide valuable resources to those who need specialized mental health services.

The NSPD and the Mona Shores School District have a close-knit relationship, and will continue to partner together to provide a safe educational experience.

Boys Tennis, Academic Recognition, and Female Strength Training Highlight the 2021 Fall Season ~ a message from Todd Conrad, Director of Athletics

Under the direction of second-year head coach Traci Hackney, the boys tennis team has continued their ascent as one of the premier programs in west Michigan. Not only did they win their third straight Greater Muskegon Athletic Association title, they finished the 2021 season as champions of the Green Division of the Ottawa-Kent Conference. Recieving first-team allconference recognition were #1 singles Drew Hackney, #2 singles Kayden Hellmann, and the #1 doubles team of Collin Khatir and Lydia Sowles. Sophomore Drew Hackney also received first-team all-state honors for the second straight season by advancing to the round of eight at the MHSAA Division 2 Championships hosted by Hope College. It's not just athletic talent, however, that keeps the tennis program going as four seniors were named academic allstate as individuals while helping their team attain academic allstate status through the Michigan High School Tennis Coaches Association: Kayden Hellmann, Lydia Sowles, Luke Uptigrove, Sam Uptigrove & Bobby Wasserman. A huge thanks goes out to the entire program for representing Mona Shores both in and out of the classroom.



While many fall sports do not name academic all-state teams until much later in the year, the Michigan Volleyball Coaches Association has recognized the 2021 Mona Shores volleyball team as academic all-state. Just like the boys tennis team, our volleyball program had four girls named as academic all-state individuals: Holli Brus, Linden Gentzkow, Anabeth Hylland, and Grace Norris. Congratulations to the girls volleyball team on excellent performances both in the classroom and on the court.

Mona Shores athletes improving themselves in the off-season has been a standard practice for decades. It's the reason many of our teams have been so successful over the years. One of the ways that this has been accomplished is through participation in a strength & conditioning class during the school day. During the 2019-2020 school year, however, only 10 of our female athletes were enrolled in such a class. This fall, we have tripled the number of girls

enrolled by creating a female strength & conditioning class taught by Head Girls Basketball Coach Mike Phillips. Under the direction of Mercy Health Athletic Trainer Dan Schroeder, those athletes are given research-based daily workouts to help develop overall athleticism and prevent injury. These workouts are distributed via the Volt Athletics training app that provides daily feedback to our girls about their improvement. In just eight weeks in the program,

our female athletes have already seen measurable improvement in the volume of weight they are able to lift in a wide variety of exercises. The Volt Athletics interactive tool was funded by the Sailor Classic Foundation. A huge thanks goes out to this organization for providing innovative ways for our athletes to get better.

SEL student team members have created PSA's for the daily Sailor Broadcast news and just recently created Wellness Week. Creating a building wide awareness of



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COUNSELOR'S CORNER by Danielle Smith-Walker, Director of Counseling

The mission of the Mona Shores High School Guidance and Counseling Program is to provide support for student achievement in partnership with parents, staff and community. Counseling services will be provided in a safe and positive environment with a focus on college, career and life readiness.

COLLEGE, CAREER AND LIFE READY!

In an effort to ensure that all students are College, Career and Life Ready, we employ a wide variety of tools to assist them. We begin early utilizing career interest inventories to assist students in identifying possible career pathways. Currently, we utilize XELLO. Xello helps students plan their own unique journey whether it involves a trade, college, university, entrepreneurship, or other training. Our district will develop Educational Development Plans (EDP) with students in order for them to understand their skills, values, career choices and college training options. The district shares a Career Specialist that is based out of the MAISD that may facilitate work based learning opportunities for students that include job shadows, externships, and internships. In addition to the learning opportunities, students are also exposed to several career exploration events such as: Modern Manufacturing Day, Groundhog Shadow Day, MiCareerQuest, and Muskegon Made Job Fair. There are lots of options for students! As we approach the new scheduling season, if interested in any of these, or to learn more information, please contact the counseling office.

STUDENT SCHEDULING FOR 2022-2023 BEGINS IN JANUARY

Counselors will begin meeting with students in scheduling assemblies shortly after the holiday break. Students will be given a copy of their transcript to review and will be instructed to select their classes for the next school year. Parents can assist their sons and daughters in this process by reviewing their choices, signing the course selection sheet, reminding them to return the materials to school on time and finally scheduling with them online at home. Counselors and students will meet individually during this time to review their scheduled course selections for accuracy and planning.

EXTENDED DAY AFTER SCHOOL TUTORING

SAT

Junior Registration: The State of Michigan will pay for all juniors to take the SAT test on April 13 during the school day. On April 14 students will take the ACT Workkeys. Juniors will be able to send 4 free scores to colleges that they are considering attending. They should give this some thought ahead of time because they will be asked to give that information. Parents, please be mindful that this is the third day after Spring Break (State Mandated Date) and it is important that your student be present. Also, please note that this exam is required for graduation.

FAFSA

Students have to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, for each school year to qualify for grants, scholarships, federal work-study and federal student loans. But deadlines vary for federal, state and institutional aid. Each year, the FAFSA opens on Oct. 1. File your FAFSA as close to Oct. 1 as possible to improve your chances of qualifying for the most grant, scholarship and work-study aid. **Please Note:** You can call the Financial Aid Office at Baker College or Muskegon Community College and get help for FREE on filling out the Financial Aid Form. Beware of people who want to charge you for this service, or of people who promise to get you Financial Aid if you pay them to complete your form. When in doubt, call first for advice. Go to **https://studentaid.gov/aid-estimator/** for an early estimate of federal aid eligibility. Additional information is available at https://**studentaid.gov/**.

SCHOLARSHIP NOTICES

The following is a sampling of some of our local scholarships that offer multiple opportunities. Scholarship notices are posted throughout the building, on our website, and on the announcements.

THE MUSKEGON AREA PROMISE: The Muskegon Area Promise makes a unique commitment to the young people of our community - if they work hard they will be able to earn at least a two-year college degree tuition free. The Promise Scholarship is an award promised to resident graduates of high schools within the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District boundaries. It provides the financial assistance necessary to obtain a two-year degree or its equivalent at an eligible partnering institution when used in conjunction with federal, state and institutional grants. Students must graduate with a cumulative 3.5 GPA or higher from a high school located within the boundaries of the MAISD. Please go to: http://www.muskegonisd. org/career-college/promise/ for more information.

COMMUNITY FOUNDATION FOR MUSKEGON COUNTY: CFFMC offers a number of scholarships. Most are for seniors going away to a four-year school. Some are for students going to a vocational or technical program. They do offer a few merit-based scholarships worth more money. Financial need is often a consideration.

Deadline: February 1. The application is now online at the Foundation website, www.cffmc.org. Please visit the website for more information.

MEA SCHOLARSHIPS: Last year 36 scholarships totaling \$30,000 were awarded based upon leadership, community service, and academics. Preference is given to children of MEA members. You can fill out a scholarship application at http://www.mea.org/mea**scholarship**. The deadline for applications is February 17, 2022.

MICHIGAN COMPETITIVE SCHOLARSHIP: Any senior who attained a qualifying score of at least a 1200 on the SAT is eligible for this scholarship. We will notify those that qualify and alert them to the next step. This is renewable and worth up to \$1300 per year. Students must attend a Michigan public college and show financial need. You must file the FAFSA, and it must be received by March 1. Social security numbers are required. See your counselor for details. AMERICAN LEGION SCHOLARSHIPS: American Legion gives a number of \$500 scholarships to children and sometimes grandchildren of Veterans. Go to www.michiganlegion.org/ scholarships and www.michalaux.org for more information.

WOMEN'S DIVISION CHAMBER OF COMMERCE: A minimum of six \$1000 scholarships are available to all students planning to attend Muskegon Community College or Baker College full time. TUITION INCENTIVE PROGRAM (TIP): This is an incentive (and need based) program that encourages eligible students to complete high school by providing tuition assistance for the first two years of college and beyond. To meet the financial eligibility requirement, a student must have (or have had) Medicaid for at least two years between the age of nine and high school graduation, you are encouraged to contact MI Student Aid or call 888-447-2687 to learn more. Counselors met with TIP eligible seniors to review this opportunity. If you think your student may be eligible please contact their high school counselor.

BEHAVIOR DATA | Last year, we had very good data numbers, documenting nearly every situation, big or small. Clearly, last year was a different experience. This year, while our students are re-establishing how they move in the hallways, engage

socially, and interact with adults at school, our overall numbers are down! We have 30% of discipline coming from less than 1% of our students. Additionally, we are well below the national average. Know that we will continue to hold our students accountable to high expectations of respect and ownership. Collectively, I am proud

of our students for their overall positive behavior and choices! PEER TO PEER | Our Peer to Peer (P2P) class continues to be a huge success. Students in this class are learning about acceptance, various disabilities, engagement, and overall relational capacity. They are working with other students who have different abilities, bringing them into the culture of our building, establishing authentic relationships, and learning

alongside each other. I look forward to seeing this class grow, develop, and impact our school climate and culture; I look forward to seeing these students impact our community! I am **proud** of this class, these students, and the adults that lead it!

DAILY INSTRUCTION Visiting classrooms, being present in hallways, and seeing final products, know that our teachers are creating outstanding learning opportunities for our students! What we have observed include: refurbishing home furniture in Trades Academy, discussing heroes in The Outsiders, building roller coasters in STEM class, solving two-step equations in math class (and applying them), collaborating in a GooseChase, performing at a concert, or engaging in high level workouts in 21st Century Fitness. At MSMS, daily opportunities for our students abound! I am proud of the work of our teachers and the engagement of our students.

MONTHLY CHARACTER TRAITS | Our students, staff, and families continue to reflect, learn, and grow with our character traits. Mrs. Butterfield, one of our counselors, does a phenomenal job of creating lessons and activities for students and staff that reinforce positive behavior and strengthen character. Teachers are intentional in recognizing, discussing, and tying the focus trait into their curriculum. Administrators work hard to remind our students each week of our focus trait, challenging them to consider what it might look like, how it might impact their lives, and in what ways might they be able to model that trait. I am **proud** of our staff and families for intentionally focusing on these traits with our students.

As we continue to learn, grow, and strive to be the best Middle School for our students, we must continue to challenge each



other to be the best version of ourselves that we can possibly be - our best as students, educators, parents, friends, and community members. No matter what role we assume




