CURRICULUM

Ensuring Big Reds are Readers and Mathematicians

Reading is essential for having a successful career and for enjoying life. At MPS, we are committed to ensuring our students have the skills to read and do math at high levels. Our goal is to make sure students can read for fun and enjoyment as well as have the skills needed for reading manuals at work or reading research articles in college. Math is no different. Whether mentally determining change at a store or calculating exponential graphs for a global pandemic, our students need to be prepared in an ever-changing mathematical world.

To help students read and do math at high levels, we use iReady to determine their level of ability in the fall, test again in the winter to measure growth and then again in the spring as a final measurement. In the fall, students are provided with a learning path that moves them from one level of reading or math to another. Students are required to complete 45 minutes a week of reading and 45 minutes of math on their personalized learning path.

i-Ready is an online program for reading and/ or mathematics that will help your student's teacher(s) determine your student's needs, personalize their learning, and monitor progress throughout the school year. i-Ready allows a teacher to meet your child exactly where they are and provides data to increase your child's learning gains. i-Ready consists of two parts: Diagnostic and Personalized Instruction. The i-Ready Diagnostic is an adaptive assessment that adjusts its questions to suit your student's needs. Each item a student sees is individualized based on their answer to the previous question. For example, a series of correct answers will result in slightly harder questions, while a series of incorrect answers will yield slightly easier questions. i-Ready Personalized Instruction provides students with lessons based on their individual skill level and needs, so your student can learn at a pace that is just right for them. These lessons are fun and interactive to keep your student engaged as they learn.

Explain

Explain to your student how working on i-Ready will help their teacher(s) figure out what to teach them and how to better support them while also helping them focus their learning on exactly what they need.



Make a Plan

Make a plan with your student for how to spend their time at home and when they will work on their learning activities. It can be helpful to put the plan in writing and post it somewhere visible. As you make the plan, follow any guidance you received from your student's teacher(s) on what they should work on.



Share

Share the experience with your student. Both of you can become familiar with the different parts of the student dashboard, and you can learn with your student as they complete a lesson.



Encourage your student to take each lesson and guiz guestion seriously. Emphasize "thinking before clicking," because just clicking through will not be a productive use of their time nor reflect what your student actually knows. Remind your student to read passages in their entirety, use paper and pencil to solve math problems, and use the tools that appear at the bottom of the screen in some lessons.



Track and Discuss Progress

Regularly review progress with your student using the My Progress page. Please ask your student's teacher(s) for guidance on how many minutes they should spend on lessons each week, as schools have discretion on what they assign. Our recommendation is that your student should aim for 45 minutes of i-Ready Personalized Instruction per subject per week while passing at least 70 percent of lessons.



Celebrate your student's progress. Celebrating milestones, such as passing a lesson or reaching a specific goal, can help keep your student motivated. You can share celebrations with the rest of the family and even decide on a fun activity as a reward. You can use these data trackers as you and your student discuss and keep track of progress.




Follow the teacher's guidance as you plan how your student will spend their learning time. Your student's teacher is your best resource for ensuring there is variety in the activities your student works on beyond the time they spend on online learning.

The diagram below is a guidepost in our work at Muskegon Public Schools. Developed by the Centers for Disease Control using the tenets of the Association of Supervision and Curriculum Development, the focus is on the partnership of educators, parents and community partners to ensure our students are safe, healthy, engaged, supported and challenged.

While we are always looking to expand our community partnerships, we have developed many programs based on the expertise and wisdom of area professions for which we will be forever grateful. Our partnership with Health West allows our students and their families to see a doctor, a nurse, a dentist, or a mental health professional in our own school buildings. Our relationship with Community EnCompass allows us to utilize their building



and renovation skills with our sophomores in Geometry in Construction where students learn to apply their knowledge that will last a lifetime. We have also partnered with DTE and Greenhorn Training Solutions to offer our seniors the opportunity to learn onthe-job skills and to earn a living wage within 3 months after graduation. We have opened a PreK4All preschool and daycare program based on the needs of our families and the support of area donors and businesses such as Howmet, United Way Lakeshore, Shape Corporation, and many more!

This February, our encore teachers (P.E., Art, Music, Technology) will be creating a special school-wide program for Black History Month. Each of these teachers at the elementary buildings will design a project related to their subject area and highlighting an area tied into Black History. They will work on this project for 5 weeks with their students and in late February or early March, each school will showcase their projects. This showcase may be live or a video presentation, but these wonderful projects will be put on display for the whole MPS community. We are excited to see their new learning and hard work! Reading and Writing - Inside Out

Winter is here, and for some of us, that means hunkering down inside until the sun feels warm again. And for some, the winter beauty calls them outside. The families of our students at MPS are important partners with us, and this time of year is the perfect opportunity to participate in cozy, meaningful reading and writing activities together. Doing activities with children at home allows practice of the skills they are learning in school while having fun with family at the same time.

START WITH A BOOK. Find a book that has a winter theme building a snowman, a winter storm, sledding, etc. Some favorites are *The Snowy Day* by Ezra Jack Keats and *The Mitten* by Jan Brett. Read it together. If your child needs your support, remember it is less important for them to get every word right, and more important to learn to love reading. What better way than reading with someone they love!

At this point, if your family is on the adventurous side, go outside for a winter walk, build a snowman or fort, go sledding. Talk with your child about what they are doing, what they see, and how they are feeling. If you'd rather stay inside, have them draw a picture and have the same conversation. Developing oral language and vocabulary skills leads to better readers and writers.

WRITE ON! Follow the reading/language activity with a writing activity. Reading helps children become better writers, and writing helps them become better readers. If your child is young, let them dictate the story to you, write what they can, and read it together. Older students can write on their own. Ask them questions about their writing, and give enthusiastic feedback. Don't be overly concerned with mistakes. It is more important to have the courage to write and want to continue.

Whether your family enjoys winter inside or out, take this time to help your child continue to grow as a reader and writer. At MPS we know the value of families to help us with the education of our children, and we thank you for your partnership.

Ensuring Big Reds are Readers and Mathematicians

GUARANTEED CURRICULUM

It's hard to believe it is already January and we are almost half way through the school year! Teachers have been working hard to implement a "guaranteed curriculum" for math in grades K - 5. You might wonder what that means? A "guaranteed curriculum" is defined as a means through which all students have an equal opportunity, equal time, and equal access to learn rigorous grade level content--in our case, math content. This work is important because, according to Marzano (2003), having a guaranteed curriculum is "The single most important initiative a school or district can engage in to raise student achievement..." The key word in this is "all". In order for all students to have, not only "all" students but also, "all" teachers. When all teachers implement a guaranteed curriculum for all students with fidelity, student achievement is bound to improve.

This work began in August 2021 with the K - 5 Math Leadership team as they began to determine the essential math content for each grade level. A byproduct of their work has been the development of "Guaranteed Curriculum Components Guide" documents for each Everyday Mathematics unit for each grade level.The members of each grade level team have identified which components of each unit and lesson are non-negotiable, guaranteed, and will be implemented with fidelity by all MPS teachers. Lesson components that are optional, when time allows, have also been identified. This gives teachers flexibility to meet student needs, interests, and strengths.

The Math Leadership Team has been surveying classroom teachers each time a Guaranteed Curriculum Components Guide for a new unit is released. So far, the feedback from teachers has been very positive! MPS students are now learning more math content than ever before and are experiencing success.

OFFICE OF SPECIALIZED INSTRUCTION

START training

Our OSI team at Bunker Elementary School has an exciting learning opportunity. They are currently participating in a training series called The Statewide Autism Resources and Training Project (START/GVSU). This Intensive Training series focuses on evidencebased practices to increase knowledge and skills that enhance the educational programming and outcomes for students with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD) and related disabilities from preschool through post high school. Intensive training is provided to multidisciplinary teams including teachers, administrators, ancillary staff, community partners, and parents.



Each team is composed of six individuals who attend each training session and work collaboratively to develop implementation plans for target students, classrooms, programs, and school buildings. This year there are two teams from Bunker Elementary school going through this intensive training. The training is a 2 year commitment for the Bunker staff. One of the pieces that the team is most excited about implementing this year is a Peer To Peer Program. The program will be called Bunker Besties and will allow students with and without disabilities to build a kind and inclusive community of learners. The phenomenal Bunker team engaging in this training includes the following Muskegon Public Schools and Muskegon Area Intermediate School District employees: Taylor Thorpe (School Psychologist/BCBA), Leanne Bauer (OSI Instructional Coach), Beth Sturr (ASD Teacher), Dawn Fields (Occupational Therapist), Lyssa Cooper (Kindergarten Teacher), Molly Plowe (Level 1 Resource Teacher), Amy Donaldson (Speech Pathologist), Matthew Beld (Speech Pathologist), Latanya Wheeler (School Social Worker), Martha Knoll-Loader (ASD Teacher), Kori Hansen (Assistant Principal/Supervisor), and Missy Post (MAISD).

New Year

Last school year was a major learning experience for everyone here in the district, especially in the Technology Department. Over the course of the school year, everyday seemed like a new experience when it came to supporting students, staff and parents with their online learning experience. For us, we're used to being able to reach out and touch the users we support, so that was a pretty big adjustment. We have definitely grown from that experience, as we were forced to find new and better ways to support our end users and we're grateful for it.

We have been a one to one district for a while now, but it was not a take home one to one until COVID struck. We've had some devices that were starting to get a little up there in age, so we implemented a device refresh policy where Chromebooks will be replaced with new devices every four years. This year, Chromebooks were replaced with new devices in grades 1st, 5th and 9th. We also transitioned our kindergarten students to touchscreen Chromebooks. We'll continue this cycle on a yearly basis, as this will help keep devices fresh, and we will see less wear and tear over the life of the device. Remind students that their Chromebook is theirs during their time at Muskegon Public Schools, so they need to take great care of their device at all times!

MPS Enrollment

Our MPS families are now able to enroll their student(s) online. Simply go to our website: (www.muskegonpublicschools.org), under Parent Resources, enrollment information, select the enrollment link.

You can take a picture of all required documents to upload during the online enrollment process. We have computers available at each one of our buildings including the Administration Building (now located at 1458 5th Street, Room E126).

Required Documents:

- Two proofs of residency: **MUST** provide a copy of your utility bill, assessment/property tax statement, rental/lease agreement (must include landlord's telephone and signature) and one other piece of mail, no junk mail. Dated within 30 days at time of enrollment.
- Parent/Guardian's Identification: Driver's license or passport
- Birth Certificate: An original certified/state issued birth certificate that can be viewed and copied by MPS
- Official Michigan Immunization Records: State law requires that your child's immunizations must be up-to-date or your child cannot enter school. Pick up a copy from your local health department.
- Custody/Guardianship court documents (if applicable)
- Copy of most current Special Education/IEP (if applicable)
- Transcripts and current grades from previous school for High School students

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Thinking back to your time in elementary, middle, and high school... did you have a parent or guardian that was engaged in your school? As I look back at my own time in school, my parents were not very involved in the day-to-day happenings. There were younger siblings at home to take care of, and long hours working to make ends meet. But one memory stands out to me... donut day, 1970. Standing in line with my money, who do I see passing out donuts, my Mom! Even after all of these years, I remember how special I felt seeing my Mom at school volunteering.

A growing body of research tells us that for schools to fully partner with families, they must respect and embrace all the various family's cultures, structures, and circumstances. It is essential that schools shape their efforts to partner with parents in ways that support parents' motivation for involvement, making them feel welcomed (Hoover-Dempsey & Sandler, 1995, 1997). If you had a negative experience in school or with a teacher, how comfortable are you entering your child's school, do you feel welcomed?

As the District's Family Engagement Coordinator, I'm excited to partner with our families by seeing that the Middle Schools and each of our Elementary Schools now have their own Family Engagement Coordinators. The Family Engagement Coordinators will provide programs and services to promote, encourage, and empower parents and guardians in their role as their child's most important teacher. This partnership cannot be successful unless home to school connections are easier for families. One way for parents to become involved in their child's school is to be a part of the newly formed School – Home Partnership Teams which are being organized by the Family Engagement Coordinators. Teams will meet monthly to give parents the opportunity to be updated on school happenings, build trust with families, and empower families to voice their ideas and concerns.

Oh, how I love this time of the vear in elementary school. I love the excitement in the eves of the children each and every day. It truly is the most

wonderful time of year. However, with this wonderful time of year comes the c-c-ccold outside. I have lived in the Muskegon area all of my life and I STILL am not used to this weather! Thank you for remembering to send your students with coats, gloves, hats, snow boots, etc.; whatever it takes to keep them warm each day as we go outside. Please keep in mind that we will be outside most davs.

With the winter months and more severe weather conditions of winter. I want to review our inclement weather policy to both reassure and help parents, guardians, and students prepare and plan:

- We recommend that students arrive at school no earlier than 7:55 for supervision purposes.
- Children should arrive at school dressed for the weather of the day so they can safely and comfortably enjoy recesses. In winter months, children should remember to bring shoes to change into from their snow boots. Each month, Assistant Principal Amado Perez' hosts grade level Big Red Assemblies. Students gather in the gymnasium with their classmates and teachers to recognize and celebrate success. Every student has the opportunity to be recognized throughout the school year. Each assembly begins with a review of one BIG REDS school wide expectation. As a reminder, BIG REDS stands for "Believe In Greatness....Responsible, Excellent, Dependable and Safe". Mr. Perez' reviewed the BIG REDS expectations for riding the bus at the most recent Assembly. After the review of the BIG REDS expectation students are recognized and celebrated in the following ways:

1. Recognize class salutes

This is the favorite award for the students. The student of the month has their picture taken and displayed in the front foyer, is issued a certificate and prizes and earns a special lunch with Principal Mary Scott. Oakview Reading Buddies

What makes a school different from any other building? Like all buildings, schools consist of walls, rooms, doors, and windows. At Oakview Elementary, it's the people inside those rooms and walls that make all the difference! In addition to the wonderful staff, students, and parents who walk our halls everyday, Oakview is blessed to have the Reading Buddies program.



The *Reading Buddies* program was brought to Oakview through a partnership between our Family Liaison, Ebony Williams, and the founder of *Reading Buddies*, Lynn Kamps. Prior to its closing, the *Reading Buddies* program operated at Nelson Elementary School for 9 years. We are happy to now benefit from it here at Oakview. Ebony and Lynn work with

Oakview's Intervention Team to connect community members with targeted students to improve their reading skills. Adult volunteers from the Muskegon community give an hour or two each week to read with students. The goal of the program is to help the targeted children improve their reading skills.

The *Reading Buddies* program provides a consistent opportunity for targeted Oakview students to practice reading their SFA (Success For All) story of the week to their Reading Buddy. After the student finishes reading their weekly SFA story, the student then discusses the text with their buddy using guiding questions that accompany each story. If time, the student is free to select a different book to read from the collection of books in the room.

Safety is very important to Oakview and our families! All of the adults have completed a volunteer application and background screening before being accepted as a Reading Buddy. Volunteers and students wear facemasks at all times. Additionally, all desks and surfaces are sanitized between groups of students.

Please contact Ebony Williams if you have any questions about the program or if you are interested in becoming a Reading Buddy. All it takes is an hour or two per week, a love for books, and a desire to help children improve their reading.
