The Mona Shores App will put all of the important information right at your fingertips for easy access on any mobile device. You can also set up alerts, view the dining menu, subscribe to the news feed, view the calendar of events, and more. The app is designed for quick access to important information for all users.

Updated Website

The Mona Shores website also underwent an overhaul and update. The new and improved site is much more vibrant, intuitive, and user-friendly. It matches the look and feel of the App but with all of the information you are used to being available there. The web address remains the same but the user experience will be completely new.



Bus & Route Tracking, Video Monitoring, and Student Check-In

Work is also underway with potential additions to the tools our transportation team and our families are able to utilize with regard to bussing. This school year we upgraded the interior and exterior cameras on our buses. The additional interior cameras allow much better vision of the entire bus and the exterior cameras now provide the necessary views the police require to help enforce any red light runners. The increased safety has already impacted our students in a positive way!

Looking to the future, tools such as GPS bus and route tracking/monitoring along with the potential for student checkin on buses are all part of the discussion and future planning. While implementation dates, costs, definitive pieces, and functionality are all still in the exploration phase we are excited by the options available to continue to improve the experience for our kids and families.

Bonded Construction Update

CAMPBELL

Campbell Elementary is finished! All classrooms and common areas are complete and the students and staff have settled into their new spaces. This building was scheduled to be completed in February 2023, but was accelerated to the end of November due to the diligent work of Triangle (our construction management firm) and all the contractors. Original construction cost was \$12,629,815. We had budgeted an additional \$1,227,000 in construction contingencies and allowances of which we have \$112,125 remaining to date, for a total build cost of \$13,856,815. We fully expect to have some minor items pop up and need correcting throughout the winter, which could reduce that remaining contingency amount should that occur.







ROSS PARK

Construction is continuing to go well. Ross Park Elementary is on schedule and our new gym/music space and main lobby will be finished and available for use after Christmas break. The Middle School eighth grade locker commons was completed in October and we will transition students into that space sometime after Thanksgiving. Construction at both buildings will continue throughout the school year in various spaces. We expect Ross Park to be complete at the end of August 2023 with the remodel of the daycare wing and new drop off loop on the south side of the building. At the Middle School, the seventh grade wing will be renovated over the upcoming summer. Once again, I would like to thank our community and staff for their support and patience throughout this project.



ARoosevelt Park Police Department, I'd like to take this opportunity to share a little bit about myself and what I and my agency will do to benefit you, your families, and your Mona Shores Public School student.

I've spent the last 32 years working, and studying in the Law Enforcement field. I hold a bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice, have begun working towards my Master's Degree in Public Administration, and am a

graduate of dozens of specialized Law Enforcement schools and trainings, including the prestigious Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command.

Prior to being hired by the Roosevelt Park Police Department, I spent nearly 27 years with the City of Muskegon Police Department, retiring in January 2022 as **Detective Captain.**

Since becoming the top cop in Roosevelt Park this September, I have been approached numerous times and asked about my philosophy on policing and the direction I will lead the Department. I would like to take this opportunity to express my thoughts on policing and the role of the Roosevelt Park Police Department within this community.

I am a very strong advocate of community involved policing. This concept is not new, these are not my original ideas, and most importantly it's certainly not a list of activities which you go down and check off the boxes as completed. It is a value system which permeates the department.

The goal is to work cooperatively with individual citizens, groups of citizens, and both public and private organizations to identify and resolve issues which potentially affect the livability of the community. Working with the community we will stress prevention, early identification and timely intervention by dealing with issues before they become unwieldy problems.

Officers are encouraged to spend considerable time and effort in developing and maintaining personal

s the new Chief of the relationships with citizens, schools. businesses, and community organizations. By fostering this relationship, we can significantly improve the ability of the department to discover criminal conduct, clear offenses, and make arrests. This is a process that evolves, develops, takes root and grows, until it is an integral part of the formal and informal value system of both the police and community as a whole.

> My philosophy of policing emphasizes citizen interaction and participation in problem solving. It exists when officers spend a significant amount of their available time out of their patrol cars, when officers are a common sight in schools, businesses, parks and walking around town. It is when an organization wouldn't even think of tackling a significant issue of community concern without involving the police.

> Policing is much more than law enforcement. Officers need to accept a significant role in issues that might be referred to as "social work". Roosevelt Park Police Officers understand that being involved in "social work" is a form of valid and valuable police work, which affects the livability of a community. Rather than treating these activities as diversions from "real" police work, officers need to understand that this is the essence of their work.

> The department will define success and accomplishment primarily by outcomes and the satisfaction of the consumer of our services, the citizens of Roosevelt Park, rather than by strictly internal measures of the amount of work completed. We need to increase the emphasis on outcomes. Doing the right thing is as important as doing things right.

> I am very fortunate to have the type of caliber of men and women who are currently employed within the department to start this journey with. They are consummate

professionals that have dedicated themselves unselfishly for the betterment of our community. We are excited to bring our service to the next level and for all the successes that lie ahead.

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Technology Update

What does the picture above have to do with radio waves? Not the cellular tower in the middle. The new field turf, actually! The majority of it was funded by the sale of a piece of ITFS/EBS spectrum owned by Mona Shores.

Back in 1963 the FCC authorized the Instructional Television Fixed Service (ITFS) later to be known as the Education Broadband Service (EBS). The intent of this was to allow education television broadcasts for the license holders locally, over this licensed radio spectrum. Schools typically lacked the resources to get into the broadcasting business. The FCC recognized this and authorized leasing of the spectrum in the late 70's. Many were not even aware of its existence. In the early 1990's, Mona Shores secured their eligible portion of the EBS spectrum and it remained unused.

2005 came and technology in schools was starting to see greater use and adoption. Lane White, Director of Technology at the time, recognized the value of this resource and negotiated a lease agreement with a third party. From this agreement, Mona Shores received one of the early school enterprise grade WiFi installs in Muskegon county, monthly cash benefit and several other services. The lessee used the spectrum to backhaul its wireless system to provide WiFi services to underserved areas.

The original benefits and agreement ran their course in 2020. The wireless landscape had changed immensely by this time. 2019 had seen the FCC remove its requirements for the spectrum to be used for educational purposes only. Most of the spectrum in this range had been converted over for 4G cellular usage and was no longer used for television. 5G networks were on the horizon and the spectrum was once again generating interest. Mona Shores began communication with an interested party about the outright sale of the spectrum.

In 2021 an agreement was reached between Mona Shores and a party for the outright sale of the ITFS/EBS spectrum. The proceeds of this sale were used to fund the installation of the field turf for Sailor Stadium. The field turf has greatly expanded the use of the field due to its durability. This is a great resource for Mona Shores to have in place after many years.

TRANSPORTATION NEWS

Athletic Update

The 2022 fall athletic season at Mona Shores High School was yet another successful one for the Sailors. Girls golf, boys soccer, and football all won OK Green Conference championships while volleyball and boys tennis both won Greater Muskegon Athletic Association championships. Volleyball, football, and soccer all had exciting playoff runs with each team appearing in the MHSAA District finals. Check out more highlights below:

- While Academic All-State honors for most sports won't be announced until later in the winter, we do know that the volleyball team continued their decades-long streak obtaining this honor. Seniors Chloe Rose, Ava Dunn, Ali Trautner, and Lauren Morea also received academic allstate as individuals from the Michigan Volleyball Coaches Association.
- The 60th year of football was another successful one as the boys earned Coach Koziak's 100th win as a Sailor, enjoyed their 6th consecutive season opening the MHSAA playoffs with a win, bringing our overall football playoff record to an impressive 22-7.
- The girls swim team had a conference champion in senior Delaney Buckner, who won both the 100 fly and the 100 backstroke.
- Senior Robyn Hunt capped a tremendous four-year run of simultaneously competing in cross country and swim every fall. Incredibly, she received all-conference honors for both sports this season. Robyn will take her talents to Duquesne University, where she will compete in intercollegiate triathlons.
- For the first time since 2016, the Mona Shores cross country program qualified individuals for the MHSAA state finals. Senior Caleb Branch and freshman Ellery Horness both finished in the top 100 in Division 1 at the Michigan International Speedway on November 5th.

The big highlight of the fall, though, has to be the boys tennis team, who qualified as a team for the state championships for the first time since the 2000-2001 school year. Coach Traci Hackney was named Regional Coach of the Year while her son, junior Drew Hackney, finished as a state quarter finalist in the #1 singles division. This is the third year in a row that Drew has been named first-team all-state by the Michigan Tennis Coaches Association, bringing his overall career record to 74-10. Probably the most exciting match of the state championship weekend for Mona Shores, though, was the firstround #1 doubles match with senior Tommy Stewart and junior Liam Gossett. The Sailor duo beat the team from North Farmington in a back-and-forth affair that lasted roughly two hours. It was a proud moment for the boys as they played in front of at least a couple dozen Mona Shores teammates, parents, and fans in the indoor courts at the Greater Midland Tennis Center. It was a wonderful weekend of competition and camaraderie for the whole team.

Counselor's Corner

The mission of the Mona Shores High School Guidance and Counseling Program is to provide support for student achievement in partnership with parents, staff and community. Counseling services will be provided in a safe and positive environment with a focus on college, career and life readiness.

COLLEGE, CAREER AND LIFE READY!

In an effort to ensure that all students are College, Career and Life Ready, we employ a wide variety of tools to assist them. We begin early utilizing career interest inventories to assist students in identifying possible career pathways. Currently, we utilize XELLO. Xello helps students plan their own unique journey whether it involves a trade, college, university, entrepreneurship, or other training. Our district will develop Educational Development Plans (EDP) with students in order for them to understand their skills, values, career choices and college training options. The district shares a Career Specialist that is based out of the MAISD that may facilitate work based learning opportunities for students that include job shadows, externships, and internships. In addition to the learning opportunities, students are also exposed to several career exploration events such as: Modern Manufacturing Week, MiCareerQuest, and the senior Job Expo. There are lots of options for students! As we approach the new scheduling season, if interested in any of these or to learn more information, please contact the counseling office.

STUDENT SCHEDULING FOR 2023-2024 BEGINS IN JANUARY

Counselors will begin meeting with students regarding scheduling shortly after the holiday break. Similar to last year, ALL students will receive scheduling instructions at the same time. Students should review their historical grades in their portals to review previous classes and their current schedules to complete their Graduation Audit and update their four year plan. Parents can assist their students in this process by reviewing their choices, signing the course selection sheet, reminding them to return the materials to school on time and finally scheduling with them online at home. Counselors and students will meet individually during this time to review their scheduled course selections for accuracy and planning.

Students needing tutoring can get assistance every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday after school in the Media Center. SAT

Junior Registration: The State of Michigan will pay for all juniors to take the SAT test on April 12 during the school day. On April 13 students will take the ACT Workkeys. Juniors will be able to send 4 free scores to colleges that they are considering attending. They should give this some thought ahead of time because they will be asked to give that information. Parents, please be mindful that this is the third day after Spring Break (State Mandated Date) and it is important that your student be present. Also, please note that this exam is required for graduation.

FAFSA

Students have to submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, for each school year to qualify for grants, scholarships, federal work-study and federal student loans. But deadlines vary for federal, state and institutional aid. Each year, the FAFSA opens on Oct. 1. File your FAFSA as close to Oct. 1 as possible to improve your chances of qualifying for the most grant, scholarship and work-study aid. Please Note: You can call the Financial Aid Office at Baker College or Muskegon Community College and get help for FREE on filling out the Financial Aid Form. Beware of people who want to charge you for this service, or of people who promise to get you Financial Aid if you pay them to complete your form. When in doubt, call first for advice. Go to https://studentaid.gov/aid-estimator/ for an early estimate of federal aid eligibility. Additional information is available at https://studentaid.gov/.



MICHIGAN COMPETITIVE SCHOLARSHIP: Any senior who attained a qualifying score of at least 1200 on the SAT is eligible. We will notify those who qualify and alert them to the next step. You must file the FAFSA, and it must be received by March 1. Social security numbers are required. See your counselor for details.

MICHIGAN ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS: Starting with the high school class of 2023, students will be eligible for more financial aid from the State: Eligible if family demonstrates financial need on completed FAFSA. High school seniors can get started by filing the FAFSA and by creating a MiSSG Student Portal account three to five business days after filing your FAFSA.

What is W-sitting?

It is a sitting position where the child's bottom is between the legs, with knees bent and the legs are rotated away from body.

- Why do kids w-sit?
 It gives a child a wider base of support and more stability when sitting.
- It is a convenient position to play, because the child doesn't have to work on keeping their balance.





W-sitting

Why is W-sitting a problem?

- It limits trunk rotation and reaching during play.
- It affects development of balance reactions It may shorten and tighten muscles of the hips & legs.
- It may lead to "pigeon-toe" walking and may cause back & hip pain.

What can you do to help?

Encourage other ways to sit and work on core strength.



oes your child ever ask you for help with math at home, and you aren't sure what to do? Math blues got you down? So much has changed in the world of math even over the last 5 years, so it's normal for adults at home to be frazzled when it comes to math support. Your feelings are not alone.



Our teachers have been working hard over the past few years to enhance teaching and learning through targeted math instruction. In fact, this summer our grade level teams participated in professional development with our Math Expressions textbook consultant, Robyn Decker. She shared her expertise surrounding the math resources and tools available to teachers through this math program, and she made sure that what is taught and how we test are the same at each building.

Fifth Grade Teacher Kristen Bordewyk, shared, "We were able to work with Robyn to understand new thoughts on teaching the lessons, as well as gain so much knowledge and many resources from the work she has done with Math Expressions."

In addition, many teachers have been trained in a research based math program called, Add+VantageMR (AVMR). These professional development courses focus on early numeracy development. The assessment, data collection, and teaching tools taught to educators are designed to accelerate the ability of educators to recognize students' current levels of numeracy understanding to make data-driven instructional decisions. Educators feel more ready to work with students and implement new knowledge in their teaching practices to meet the needs of a diverse range of students.

Amy VerMerris, 1st grade teacher at Campbell Elementary, attended the AVMR training and stated "AVMR is just a whole new way to look at Math. It is so beneficial for students and teachers; a hands-on approach with assessments that drive instruction, which lead to conceptual understanding."
